# LEGISLATION RE IMMUNISATION REQUREMENTS FOR CHILDCARE REBATES

The NSW Department of Health has advised that the Australian Government legislation removing conscientious objection as a valid ground for exemption from immunisation requirements (for CCB, CCR and FTB) is now law was passed by the Senate on 23 November. New arrangements come into effect on **1 January 2016**.

The NSW Department of Health has advised that children **enrolling during 2015** but **due to start in 2016**, will be considered under the existing requirements – i.e. conscientious objection will still be an acceptable ground for exemption in 2016 for those individuals enrolling ahead of time in 2015 for the purposes of eligibility for CCR, CCB and FTB.

There is no decision yet about the status of conscientious objection in relation to eligibility for enrolment (as opposed to eligibility for benefits) for children after 1 January 2016. The NSW Department of Health is currently considering its position and is consulting stakeholders including the NSW Regulator (Department of Education Early Childhood Education and Care Directorate) around implications for NSW services.

### Wagana Dance Show at Kindlehill - Wednesday Afternoon

The show is called Gaurii – have you ever found a feather. It is choreographed by Jo Clancy and looks at the stories connected to Wagan the Crow, Dinnawan the Emu, Mugi the Owl, Wirijiiribin the Lyrebird and Girrawi the Cockatoo.

The show, a palette of dance, music, puppetry and text, aims to engage the audience in thinking about the richness of Aboriginal stories and culture and our shared responsibility for maintaining and caring for country and each other.

### **School Opal card**

From term one 2016, eligible students within the Opal network will be able to travel to and from school with the new School Opal card. Most students who already have a 2015 school student travel pass will have their School Opal card automatically issued and sent to their school. Some students, including new applicants and students changing school or campuses, updating their personal details, or going from year 2 to 3 or year 6 to 7 who have already applied or who need to apply, will have their School Opal cards posted to their home address. Most School Opal cards should be received in the first two weeks of term one 2016. Students who have been approved to travel on more than one operator or to more than one home address, for example where there is shared parental responsibility, will only receive a single Opal card.

## **Travelling in term one**

School students will need to carry their School Opal card and tap on and off when travelling. A grace period applies at the start of each new school year, where school students who have been approved for SSTS travel can travel without a valid pass while new passes are being issued. Students must be in school uniform or be able to provide evidence (such as a school ID or school books) that they are travelling to or from school during this time.

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
